Goals of the Incident Command COVID-19 Response

- Slow the spread of COVID-19 in Brown County to minimize illness and death.
- Keep Brown County open using proactive prevention efforts.
- Promote both community and internal resiliency and recovery efforts.
- Ensure Brown County residents have access to COVID-19 vaccine in a timely and equitable manner.

Successes/Milestones this week

- Lambeau Field Mass Vaccination Site vaccinated almost 8,000 individuals during the first 12 days of operation.
- The COVID-19 Vaccination Coalition Charter was finalized and distributed. This charter documents the partnership and commitment of Brown County Public Health, Prevea Health, Bellin Health, Advocate Aurora, N.E.W. Community Clinic, De Pere Health Department, and Oneida Nation Comprehensive Health to work alongside each other to provide and assure community-wide COVID-19 vaccination.

Gaining voluntary compliance with health and safety recommendations.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Continued coordination efforts for vaccine clinic planning with Bellin Health. • Continued to work with NEW Community Clinic to staff their weekly vaccination clinics. • Met with community partners to discuss in-home vaccination strategies. • Facilitated a meeting with healthcare systems regarding coordinated efforts for building vaccine confidence in the community.
Improving internal processes and building capacity with consideration given to increased demands on public health.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Received an accepted offer for the emergency preparedness focused Public Health Strategist position. The individual will be starting in mid-April. • Sent out a WEAVR (Wisconsin Emergency Assistance Volunteer Registry) request to volunteers to assist at the Lambeau Field Mass Vaccination Site. • Transitioned Community Isolation and Quarantine Site to hotel vouchers to continue to meet community needs and respond efficiently due to reduced demand. • Updated internal response objectives and goals to accurately reflect all areas of the current response.




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Vaccination Planning: Biweekly Summary	
Consideration	Incident Command (IC) Response
Internal Vaccination Efforts and Processes	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Brown County Public Health has been identifying local employers who may be able to host onsite clinics to better give access to employees and populations that may otherwise not receive vaccination. The State of Wisconsin Department of Health Services has created a survey to help with identifying the industries and population groups that would be considered eligible for this type of clinic.
Vaccination Partnerships and Planning	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Brown County Public Health, in partnership with Bellin Health and the Green Bay Packers, opened the Lambeau Field Atrium mass vaccination clinic site on 3/17/21. At the opening, all three entities welcomed Governor Tony Evers to tour the facility. • Brown County Public Health facilitated meetings with local health care providers and community organizations to discuss equitable access for individuals in need of in-home vaccination. The creation of a flow chart and guiding principles are under development to ensure a uniform approach to the vaccination effort. • Brown County Public Health held discussions with representatives from the Brown County Jail to find an equitable strategy for vaccinating their current population. Barriers to success and operational logistics were assessed and Walgreens Pharmacy has agreed to vaccinate the jail population. BCPH will help with any coordination and oversight identified. • At the request of COMSA, Brown County Public Health has begun to work with the local Somali population in anticipation of Ramadan. Due to the religious practices associated with Ramadan a vaccination effort has been initiated to provide protection to those eligible.

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Notes: Intake line operates Monday-Friday 8:00am-4:30pm.

The average number of customer contacts per day stayed consistent at 39 the last two weeks.

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Community Engagement Weekly Summary

- Participated in a planning meeting to discuss mass vaccination clinic goals and performance metrics.
- Facilitated a meeting with community partners to discuss the Health Equity Coalition meeting.
- Participated in the planning of work site vaccination clinics.

Community Vaccination Weekly Summary

- Worked with the Community Engagement Branch Director to create a plan for vaccinating the Somali population. The plan is to focus on transportation and education due to time constraints.
- Worked with contracted nursing agencies to ensure adequate coverage at the Lambeau Field Mass Vaccination Clinic Site.

Environmental Health Weekly Summary

- Assisted school systems and childcare centers with COVID-19 assistance requests.
- Responded to 16 COVID-19 assistance requests from long term care facilities.
- Responded to 4 general COVID-19 related guidance requests from businesses.
